Safe and Vital Communities Pearl Street Playground, Providence *Economic Empowerment* Junior Achievement, Providence

Big Bucks Make It Safe For A "Little Hands" Playground In Providence, Rhode Island A playground where children can safely play is now a reality in Providence, thanks to the Allstate Foundation that collaborated with Injury Free Coalition For Kids, Rhode Island Hospital, the City of Providence and community members neighboring the Pearl Street playground.

On Sunday, September 26, 2004, an exciting ribbon cutting ceremony and dedication took place and the nearly abandoned Pearl Street playground in Providence received a colorful facelift. The sounds of little voices rang in the air as the children rushed into the playground after the ribbon was cut.

Kid-friendly features such as a rock wall, fire engine, swings and climbers were part of the community renovation project. Although creating a fun atmosphere is important, safety was also a priority in designing the new state-of-the-art playground. The entire play surface is covered in shock-absorbing material made from recycled shredded tires and the height of the equipment has been adjusted to make it safer for young children. A safety Tricycle Track was also added to the playground to serve as a traffic-teaching tool for nearby schools and day cares. Three tricycles were given away, along with safety helmets donated by Allstate, providing another example of Allstate's commitment to the development of safe play spaces and injury prevention.

Renovations to the Pearl Street playground were made possible by a \$70,000 grant from the Allstate Foundation. Along with the Northeast Region's senior corporate relations manager Gwen Carter, regional Allstate Foundation Chairperson Mary Capetola, Allstate Agents Ron Crosson, Ron Crosson II, and Dennis LaRoche, over one hundred children and their families attended the dedication. "What's great about this project is that it's an effective tool for injury prevention and community revitalization," says Mary Capetola. "I can't think of a better investment we could make as a company." The Mayor of Providence, David Cicilline, Dr. Barbara Barlow, director and founder of the Injury Free Coalition for Kids, Dr. Michael Mello, director of the Injury Prevention Center at Rhode Island Hospital and Julie Bromberg, program coordinator for Injury Free Coalition for Kids, were also in attendance.

"It made me feel good to see the impact of the Allstate Foundation and have people walk up to me saying – thank you Allstate for making this happen in our neighborhood." says Ron Crosson II, a 30-year Allstate agent.

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission more than 200,000 children are treated in U.S. hospital emergency rooms each year for injuries associated with playground equipment. Working hard to reduce those statistics is The Injury Free Coalition for Kids, building safe playgrounds with support from The Allstate Foundation.

Serving local community organizations: Agency Hands in the Community Grants The Agency Hands in the Community award was created in 2003 to support the local community volunteer efforts of Allstate Exclusive Agents and Personal Financial Representatives. This award includes a \$500 grant from The Allstate Foundation. Grants are awarded to nonprofit organizations that seek to improve the quality of life in communities across Rhode Island.

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Volunteering in the community: Helping Hands
