X the TXT - Don't Text and Drive Campaign Launches in Northern Ireland

This campaign was started in the US by Allstate Northern Ireland's parent company, one of the largest car insurers in America because of the increasing numbers of collisions due to people texting while driving. This is also becoming a wider issue in Northern Ireland so it was decided to launch the campaign in schools locally as part of Allstate's Community Responsibility programme.

According to Rose Kelly, Vice President & Chief Administrative Officer of Allstate Northern Ireland, 'the key objective of the campaign is to inform and educate students approaching driving age that text messaging is a significant distraction to the serious business of driving with potentially fatal consequences'. Our aim is to deliver a series of awareness events in local schools for year 13 and 14 students which will promote awareness of the dangers of text messaging while driving particularly amongst younger and inexperienced drivers'.

Ronnie Tosh, Manager of the DOE Road Safety Education Officer Service in Northern Ireland expressed his gratitude to Allstate for their campaign which will go a long way to assist the Department in educating young drivers and influencing attitudes and behaviours towards road safety.

Mr Tosh explained, "Educating the public and influencing attitudes and behaviours towards road safety is vital and the first step towards achieving this is to instil good road user attitudes and behaviours in young people. What is learnt and put into practice at an early age forms the basis of adult behaviour. Through working in partnership with organisations such as Allstate, initiatives like this will contribute to a reduction in the number of people killed or seriously injured on our roads each year".

Head of Road Policing, Superintendent Muir Clark said: "Using a mobile phone while driving is not just an offence, it can lead to a lapse of concentration that can and has resulted in people being killed in crashes on roads in Northern Ireland this year.

"Drivers must exercise proper control of their vehicle at all times. Never use a handheld mobile phone when driving. Using hands free equipment is also likely to distract your attention from the road. It is far safer not to use any telephone while you are driving. No phone call is worth losing your own or some innocent person's life. If it's a vitally important call, find a safe place to stop first.

"We welcome the fact that less people are being detected for the offence, and would remind drivers not to use mobile phones when driving, to always wear their seatbelt, drive within the speed limit and to never, ever, drive after drinking or taking drugs. Do any of these things and at best you'II be caught, put before the courts, fined or even banned from driving. The worst doesn't bear think about "

Students taking part in the event are asked to support the campaign by stamping their thumbprint on a banner which will remain at the school as a constant reminder of not to text and drive, they also receive a pair of thumb bands that read "TXTING KLLS" to wear as a daily reminder when texting.

Research conducted on Facebook by the RAC Foundation in 2008, polled 3000 drivers and found that 48% of 18-24 year olds admitted to texting while driving. Early research by the Transport Research Laboratory for the RAC Foundation found average reaction times slowed by 35% when 17-24 years olds drove in a simulator while writing or reading texts. The texters were found to drift out of lanes more, had poorer steering control and were less able to maintain a constant distance behind a lead vehicle.

Legislation to address the use of mobile phones was introduced in Northern Ireland on 27 June 2007 and the PSNI have reported that they issued 17,857 endorsable Fixed Penalty Notices from 31 July 2007 to 31st December 2008. Using a mobile phone whilst driving is still obviously an ongoing problem on our roads and it is hoped this new campaign will raise awareness amongst young people as well as the wider Northern Ireland community.

Allstate NI received Platinum Environmental Award

The Survey, carried out by ARENA Network and sponsored by the Northern Ireland Environment Agency and Belfast Harbour, annually assesses top businesses in Northern Ireland for environmental management, performance and assurance.

Environment Minister Edwin Poots, who gave the keynote address, said: "I congratulate all those businesses and organisations who have chosen to participate in this year's Survey. It is now firmly established that businesses who keep environmental issues on their agenda will see this translate into their economic bottom line."

The Minister continued: "The results show that more organisations have chosen to publicise their environmental performance with external stakeholders with 49% of participants reporting externally compared to 37% last year. This is an important step in raising the credibility of their environmental reporting.

"ARENA Network continues to review the Survey ensuring it keeps up to date with changes in business circumstances while remaining challenging for organisations. The planned Survey review in 2011 is a welcome step to maintain focus and will help keep the Survey relevant in the future."

Peter Dixon, Chair, ARENA Network explains: "This year, participation has once again increased. We had 143 organisations from 15 different sectors involved, reaching an average score is 72%, the highest since the Survey began. Impressively 19 organisations achieved platinum status, scoring 90% or more in the Survey and for the first time ever, there are no organisations in the lowest quintile."

"The resolution of companies in Northern Ireland to remain committed to making a positive impact on the environment is encouraging despite the economic challenges at present, and those which are to come."

The top results (in order of scoring) were achieved by: Michelin Tyre plc, Henry Brothers (Magherafelt) Ltd, Bombardier Aerospace, IKEA Belfast, John Graham (Dromore) Ltd, Kilwaughter Chemical Company Ltd, McLaughlin & Harvey Ltd, The Henderson Group, Dale Farm, Seagate Technology (Ireland) Ltd, NIE plc, Larne Borough Council, Western Education & Library Board, Farrans Group Limited, Moy Park Ltd, Patton Group, Translink, Allstate Northern Ireland and Belfast Harbour.

Closer Links Between Colleges and Business Will Aid NI Economy

How Northern Ireland colleges can help local businesses and what services they provide was the subject of a Committee breakfast meeting, which took place at Parliament Buildings on Wednesday, 6 October.

MLA Dolores Kelly, Chair of the Employment and Learning Committee, has put the full authority of her Committee behind this important initiative. She said: "In the current climate, and the probable cuts to the Executive budget, we need to be much more focused on making the most of public investment. We cannot afford to have a workforce that is not highly skilled, highly motivated and highly employable, with well developed transferable skills."

"I believe that our colleges have a key role to play. Not only are they instrumental in providing targeted training, they are working to equip our young people with skills needed to succeed in new sectors, such as renewable energy."

Encouraging greater links between the colleges and business sector is not the only way that the Committee is working to improve the local economy. The Committee has also taken a strong interest in those not in education, employment or training, the so-called NEETs. The Committee has recently completed an Inquiry into this issue, working closely with stakeholders and the Department for Employment and Learning (DEL). It is expected that many of the recommendations in the forthcoming report will be implemented by the Department of Employment and Learning.

Mrs Kelly is in no doubt of the importance of this twin track approach. She said: "Some 80% of the current workforce will still be in employment in 2020. Yet, many of these workers lack even basic skills in numeracy, literacy and ICT. Given that too many of our young people are also leaving school without these essential skills and without some basic job skills it is also vital that we continue to focus on these areas."

MLA Jonathan Bell, Deputy Chair of the Committee added: "Another crucial part of this important equation is support for local companies. Our local colleges are already playing a vital role by providing a wide range of professional, vocational, technical courses and pioneering new opportunities in emerging markets. One exciting programme is the Carbon Zero NI initiative where colleges are delivering training for businesses that are developing 'green' services, such as solar or wind energy generation."

"There is no room for complacency: we can all do more. It requires strategic support from politicians and businesses as well as all those interested in improving our economy and society. Both the Chair of the Committee for Employment and Learning and I are committed to achieving these goals."
